ABSTRACT

With the support of the 21st Century Community Learning Center (CCLC) grant, beginning in Summer 2015, South Tama County Community Schools will offer all families with K-6 students the opportunity to attend the STC Summer Academy to encourage college and career readiness.

In an effort to meet the needs of our community, we will offer families a safe place and affordable option for nine weeks of the summer break. Students will utilize district transportation on Monday through Friday to STC Elementary School where students will receive breakfast, lunch, and an afternoon snack. Students will receive academic and cultural enrichment in a structured and nurturing environment under the supervision and with the support of STC teachers and staff while participating in a variety of activities, including field trips, recreational sports, outdoor education, and other quality programming.

STUDENT NEEDS ASSESSMENT

DISTRICT PROFILE

South Tama County (STC) Community School District serves more than 1400 students from Tama, Toledo, Chelsea, Montour, Vining, and the Meskwaki Settlement. STC Elementary is a Title I School that serves students in Preschool through 4th Grade. This year, STC Middle School was restructured to serve 5th Grade students, as well as 6th through 8th Grade students, due to increased enrollment, facility space, and an effort to improve the overall delivery of academic services for students.

Our school community is diverse with Hispanic/Latino families, as well as a substantial Native American population. Many of our Hispanic/Latino families are served as English Language Learners, as our Hispanic population continues to grow. A portion of our Native American students tend to fluctuate in and out of our schools due to their opportunity to attend the Meskwaki Settlement Schools, located near the city of Tama on the Sac & Fox Indian Settlement (the only Settlement in the State of Iowa).

Tama County has no mass transit, no institutions of higher learning, no health or wellness centers, and no hospitals. Most employment opportunities in the area are found in hourly-wage shift work at the Meskwaki Casino, Tama Paper Board, and Iowa Premium Beef. There are only two licensed daycare centers and one Head Start center in the Tama-Toledo area. Additionally, many of our families live in rural areas with limited access to Internet service providers, after school care, summer programming, and/or personal transportation. These factors emphasize the importance of providing quality summer enrichment programs for working families.

ACADEMIC NEEDS

Data analysis of the Iowa Assessments for last year indicates that our students on free and/or reduced lunch are consistently performing below grade level proficiency at each level, particularly in reading.

Data for this grouping indicates the previous building transition between 5th and 6th Grades. We are still waiting to see the impact of the change in transition due to the move of all 5th Grade classes to the Middle School level.

STC uses the Formative Assessment System for Teachers (FAST) for our students in grades K - 2. The FAST is in its first year of implementation and will be used as a benchmark for continuing analysis of student progress. Based on our FAST scores, we know a substantial portion of our students in K-2 are below the overall composite score proficiency mark.

STC also utilizes the Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) Assessment as an additional measure of student progress in grades 3 - 11. The MAP is given to students in the Fall, Winter, and Spring for students beginning in the Spring of 2nd grade. Our analysis of overall

In consideration of what we could do to impact our instructional goals and make a significant contribution to supporting our families and students, we considered what we currently offer families and students, and what is lacking. Through our Title I services, we already offer an after school program that serves many of our elementary students, so offering an additional after school program would supplant services already in place. It was determined that offering a summer school program would have the most significant impact for our students.

We surveyed our staff, including teachers and paraeducators at all grade levels, to determine who would be available for staffing the program. We were pleased to learn that 49% of certified staff and 66% of our paraeducators are interested in working with this program. Additionally, we sent an electronic survey in English and Spanish to all families with students enrolled in grades K - 6 to determine interest in the program. Of the parents who responded, 65% were interested in having their students participate in the program. Given more opportunity to publicize the program and educate families about the opportunities provided, we are certain we will generate greater interest and participation.

While organizations in our community offer many recreational sports opportunities, there are limited options available for students without transportation. These programs also vary in length of time offered and usually do not offer much variety in terms of cultural enrichment or academic support. Based on this needs assessment, we have worked to set the stage for a robust summer enrichment program that will meet the four goals in "Results for Iowa Youth" to help students "achieve academically and develop socially, emotionally, physically, and behaviorally."

PROJECT

Beginning in the summer of 2015, the STC Summer Academy will be offered to families with students in Kindergarten through 6th Grade to encourage college and career readiness. The inaugural summer theme is "Going the Distance." The program will run from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM for a period of nine weeks (45 days / 360 hours) in June, July, and August. Our goal is to serve approximately 200 students with academic and enrichment programming.

Academic programming in the morning will include intensive work in reading and math. Enrichment in the areas of science, social studies, technology, recreation, arts, music, and healthy living will be provided in the afternoon. Transportation will be provided to all students through district transportation services. A free nutritious school breakfast and lunch will be provided to all students by the South Tama County Community School District's food service program that meets the USDA nutrition guidelines. Students will also receive a healthy snack in the afternoon.

Students enrolling in our summer school program will receive a "Going the Distance" summer school T-shirt. This shirt will be worn on the many enrichment activities we plan to provide. Having a common T-shirt will help to unite the students as a team and help in management of off-school activities such as field trips.

Each week of summer school will focus on a different theme. Community Partners and the summer school director will have the themes set up in advance of the summer school program. Currently, we have a tentative schedule with the following themes and field trips.

Our program will offer many enrichment opportunities for our students. We have designed our program to offer at least 2 hours daily (10 hours weekly) of literacy and math enrichment, and at least 2 hours daily (10 hours weekly) of science, social studies, and other activities. South Tama Elementary School has partnered with several community organizations

to provide learning and experiences for our students that will build both the background knowledge and the vocabulary that many of our impoverished students and ELL students lack. By building this background knowledge and vocabulary in our students we will be helping to raise their comprehension skills, thus increasing their overall formative and summative assessment scores.

Our academic goals are specifically related to increasing our overall scores in reading and math for students participating in the program. While our program is not expressly limited to any particular group of students, we will be focused on outreach and enrollment of our families with the greatest socioeconomic needs, as well as our families with English language learners.

SPECIFIC GOALS

Our interest in creating a summer program stems from the data showing that our summer learning curve is flat according to our Spring to Fall MAP assessment data. Additionally, our disaggregated student population data shows that our Hispanic/Latino students, Native American students, and students eligible for free or reduced lunch are not performing as well as other students. We also know that students involved in the summer recreation programs in Tama-Toledo tend to be from more affluent and educated families, and families with access to reliable transportation or who are less rural. Currently 33% of students utilize summer recreational sports opportunities, and we would like to see this increase.

- Goal 1: By June of 2018, 80% of students in grades K 2 served by the STC Summer Academy program will score at or above proficiency on the FAST Composite.
- Goal 2: By June of 2018, 80% of students in grades 3 6 served by the STC Summer Academy program will demonstrate proficiency on the Iowa Assessment Tests in Math and Reading.
- Goal 3: By Fall of 2017, 80% of students in grades 3 6 served by the STC Summer Academy program will increase their scores as measured from Spring to Fall on the MAP Assessment in Math and Reading.
- Goal 4: By June of 2018, 80% of students will have discovered new interests and acquired new background knowledge and vocabulary as measured by participation in field trips and activities. (We will develop a program specific survey instrument to use pre- and post-program with participating families.)

RESEARCH BASE

Beginning with Barbara Heyns' seminal research in *Summer Learning* (1978), research has repeatedly demonstrated that "summer learning rooted in family and community influences widens the achievement gap across social lines, while schooling offsets those family and community influences" (Alexander, Entwistle, & Olson, 2007, p. 167). Alexander, et al., further find that "cumulative achievement gains over the first nine years of children's schooling mainly reflect school-year learning, whereas the high SES-low SES achievement gap at 9th grade mainly traces to differential summer learning over the elementary years" (p. 167). In an effort to stop this gap from further developing, STC has determined that providing a robust Summer Academy program will result in long-term positive outcomes for our community, our families, and our students.

Downey, Hippel, and Broh (2004) find "not only that schools reduce inequality across socioeconomic status, but that schools reduce the much greater inequality that cannot be explained in terms of obvious ascribed characteristics" such as race, gender, and ethnicity (p. 632). Downey, et al., recommend increasing exposure to schooling through summer school programs to equalize conditions and experiences for students and to reduce inequality.

A related study of summer learning by Borman, Benson, and Overman (2005) suggests that there is a need to transform summer learning programs from mere remediation for students who are behind into "voluntary enrichment programs that are sought out by parents or highly motivated students" (p. 135). Borman, et al., also note "when parents do make it a priority to support their children's attendance at summer school, the summer slide can be prevented" (p. 147). The STC Community Schools seek to develop social capital within our community and among our families through offering the Summer Academy opportunity.

STC Summer Academy is not focused on remediation, nor is it mandatory. Instead, we seek to encourage families to participate so that their students may gain experience in a variety of activities and opportunities that may be unavailable without the district's transportation, supervision, and programming efforts. Through implementing the STC Summer Academy program, we seek to make a long-term investment in our greatest resource—our children.

MANAGEMENT PLAN

STAFFING

Staffing for our program will be done through current employees. By using current STC teachers and paraeducators in our programs, we will ensure a close connection to the school curriculum as well as to students and families. We will staff the program to provide a 10 to 1 ratio of students to teachers. In a survey of the entire district staff, 49% of our teaching staff are willing to work beyond their contract by working at a summer school program, as well as 66% of our paraeducators. Certified teachers would be compensated by an hourly wage of \$22.00 per hour and paraeducators would be compensated by receiving their current hourly wage.

We also plan to supplement our programs with volunteers from nearby universities and community colleges. Our program will provide great opportunities for college students going into education to get experience working with students. College volunteers would mainly be used to help support our enrichment programming.

TRANSPORTATION/FACILITIES

Due to the fact that our district is a rural, high poverty district, transportation will be provided through district buses and bus drivers. Students who are currently receiving handicapped transportation would continue to receive this service. For students who ride a bus to school, they would use their current route and stops to get to school. Our summer school program will be located at STC Elementary School. It will be housed in the repurposed 5th grade wing of the building. There are classroom, restroom and playground facilities in this area. The gym and cafeteria will also be utilized for enrichment activities. Currently, our summer lunch program is served out of our South Tama County elementary school, so lunch and snack facilities are also available.

PROGRAM LEADERSHIP

Our extended year program will be led by a Summer Academy Director, under the supervision of a District Administrator, who is responsible for the oversight of the summer school program and supervision of teachers, associates, and students. This person will be in charge of providing or scheduling professional development for teachers and paraeducators. The program leader will make sure all students have an individualized learning plan for the summer developed by their classroom teacher detailing the academic needs of the student. The Summer Academy Director will be in charge of coordinating services and working with community

partners. Additionally, the Summer Academy Director will work with families to promote services and increase attendance.

STAKEHOLDER ADVISORY GROUP

Our program will also have an advisory committee made up of members from our community partners, business owners, district leaders, staff members, parents, and students. This advisory committee, made up of 7 members, will meet 2 to 3 times a year beginning in the Spring of 2015. The Stakeholder Advisory Group will help to develop the program, evaluate the community survey, conduct a needs assessment of the program, evaluate program effectiveness, and oversee the addition of other committee members and community partners.

STUDENT MANAGEMENT

Student behavior management will be done through Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS). Students will have the opportunity to earn PBIS tickets for good behavior during summer school academic times and enrichment times. PBIS tickets can be redeemed for prizes and special privileges. The Summer Academy Director will work with students and staff on any behavior issues that may arise during the summer months.

To encourage attendance and full participation throughout the 9-week program, students who have 90% or better attendance record will be honored at a "Going the Distance" celebration event.

COMMUNICATION PLAN

Families will be informed about the STC Summer Academy program at spring parent-teacher conferences held in March. The STC Summer Academy will be offered to all families with children in Kindergarten through 6th Grade with a deadline for enrollment of May 1. This will allow the District sufficient time to hire appropriate staffing and communicate in advance for the first week of transportation.

Immediately before and during the program, the Summer Academy Director will communicate with parents. A schedule will be created for each student, including pick up/drop off times, academic plan, and recreational activities. Materials will be translated into the student's home language so families will be fully aware of the opportunities and activities taking place. STC currently employs a full-time Spanish translator and this person will be available as needed.

The Summer Academy Director will develop a plan of action to send out press updates to the local newspapers, *The Tama News Herald* and *Toledo Chronicle*, to promote STC Summer Academy partnerships, activities, and opportunities for our Summer Academy students. The Summer Academy Director will also provide a report to the School Board at the conclusion of the Summer Academy with information about the events, activities, and perceived impact of the program.

PARTNERSHIPS

LOCAL PUBLIC LIBRARIES

The Tama Public Library and the Toledo Public Library have both agreed to partner with our program. These libraries will be an integral part of providing both art and literature pieces to our students that are not currently available in our school or in their homes. By exposing our low SES students and our ELL students to such cultural aspects of society, we are again increasing their background knowledge and building their vocabulary, thus increasing their scores.

TAMA COUNTY CONSERVATION & IOWA STATE EXTENSION OFFICES

The Tama County Conservation Office and the Iowa State Extension office have also agreed to partner with our programs. These public entities will help provide information, materials, field trips, and experiments related to science, agriculture, and natural resources. By partnering with these two groups we not only want to build background knowledge and vocabulary, but we also want to provide our students will healthy living habits, ways to save our planet for future generations, fiscal responsibility, and experiences beyond what they would normally receive, such as fishing, canoeing, or caring for an animal.

MARSHALLTOWN HY-VEE

Marshalltown Hy-Vee has graciously agreed to a field trip opportunity for our students, as well as providing nutrition services from their registered dietician to direct activities with kids related to healthy eating. The dietician will lead hands-on activities with students including recipes for healthy snacking, taste testing produce, and benefits of eating fruits and vegetables.

IOWA PUBLIC TELEVISION

IPTV is supporting the STC Summer Academy by providing curriculum enrichment support programming for students in both math and literacy, including professional development for the Summer Academy staff using Math Adventures. Students will also benefit from *The Electric Company* programming and *PBS Kids Lab*.

TAMA-TOLEDO RECREATION DEPARTMENT

Another of our important partners is the Tama-Toledo Recreation Department.

Currently, they provide a variety of summer activities for the youth of our community. Children

in our community can play baseball, softball, golf, volleyball, and flag football. They are also given the opportunity to take swimming lessons through the American Red Cross. We would like to give our high-poverty and ELL students the same chance to take advantage of these programs. We are going to coordinate schedules to allow for our summer school students to take advantage of these recreational activities. In order to accommodate our students, the district will provide transportation to and from these activities during Summer Academy time.

TAMA COUNTY SKIP (SUPPORTING KIDS IN PREVENTION)

Tama County SKIP (Supporting Kids In Prevention) committee has also agreed to partner with South Tama elementary to provide services for the families we serve. In May of 2015, SKIP will be putting on a family fun fair to highlight the services they can provide our families. All students, kindergarten through fifth grade, and their families will be invited to attend this fun fair. There will be activities plus informational booths. The fair will be located in South Tama facilities. Some of the services they provide are: child abuse prevention, substance abuse, circles of support, parents as partners, a father initiative, gambling help, and tobacco help. Not only will SKIP be able to provide our students with help in healthy living, but they will also be able to help our families with healthy living.

FAMILY LITERACY SERVICES

With a high population of low-income and English-Language learners, one of our goals of the program is to provide opportunities for the family members of our students to receive help getting high school equivalency diplomas and/or English-language classes. We have partnered with Iowa Valley Community College and their Continuing Education department to offer two courses at our South Tama County Partnership Center. The "Multi Skills" course assists language learners with vocabulary, pronunciation, grammar and some computer skills. The "HSED" course offers help in gaining a High School Equivalency diploma. Courses are offered at varying times and free childcare is provided so parents do not encounter the hurdle of having to find and pay for childcare.

Tama County SKIP also has a wide network of support to offer parents of our families. By providing a variety of opportunities for our parents to receive information on their vast network, we hope to connect parents with the services they offer.

EVALUATION

To guide our implementation of the STC Summer Academy, we will utilize the "School Age Program Quality Assessment—Form A: Program Offerings Children Grades K-6" developed by the David P. Weikart Center for Youth Program Quality. The School-Age PQA is "designed to evaluate the quality of children's programs and identify staff training needs" (p. i), as well as to define best practice in quality programming, guide decision-making, and provide comparison data for assessment over time. Use of this instrument will enable us to evaluate our practice in the STC Summer Academy, make adjustments, and continue monitoring our program over time.

STC will evaluate the impact of our academic program by monitoring the progress of students who participate in the program on their FAST and/or MAP Assessments. We anticipate that our students' will demonstrate increased scores based on their participation in the program. Our goal is to utilize this information to further bolster support for and participation in the program by our families, particularly those in most need of summer learning opportunities.

Dixie Forcht, a district employee who serves as the secondary teacher librarian, and holds a Master Educator License, as well as an Initial Administrator License from the BOEE, will evaluate the STC Summer Academy program utilizing the School-Age PQA. Mrs. Forcht will work in cooperation with the Elementary Principal, the Department of Education, and the STC Summer Academy Director and staff to monitor, evaluate, and ensure compliance with the terms of the grant as well as the goals and activities intended for the program.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

On November 18, 2014, Assistant Principal Stacy Stull presented a broad overview of the STC Summer Academy to the STC Board of Education. Board members indicated support and agreed that there is a community need for the program. In support of this program, STC will provide the salary for the Summer Academy Director position, as well as cover the costs of facility use, custodians, and maintenance. Breakfast and lunch will be provided, as well, under the existing food service program.

Grant funds will be used to pay for staffing the program with up to 10 teachers and 10 paraeducators, professional development for summer staff, and to cover field trips, some transportation costs, snacks, materials, and evaluation of the program. The entire grant is dedicated to establishing and supplementing support for the STC Summer Academy and will not replace any existing program.
