10:00-11:30 – ORID with Jennifer Lehman

ORID is a specific facilitation framework that enables a focused conversation with a group of people in order to reach some point of agreement or clarify differences. It is fully detailed in the book [The Art of Focused Conversation](#), by the Institute of Cultural Affairs. It's based on the theory that people need to be cognizant of the actual data and deal with their emotional responses to the topic in order to undertake better analysis and decision-making.

- O-** stands for objective, the facts that can be seen, heard, etc
- R-** stands for reflective, how people felt of the topic, what they liked or disliked
- I-** stands for interpretive, what were the issues or challenges
- D-** stands for decisional, what is our decision or response

The method applies a structure to the thinking process, which prevents the conversation from drifting aimlessly. It also validates that people have emotional responses to information that they are discussing. It is versatile and can be used in many different settings and applications. ORID is very applicable when doing projects with students or leading a brainstorm session for service.
